The Big Dig walk at Keld, Swaledale 26th August 2014

It has been a few weeks since the last newsletter and as usual we have been extremely busy; digging further test pits, geophysical surveying, out walking, organizing and attending courses as described further in the following pages.

During the August Bank Holiday week we offered four organized walks to the public, one looking at geology and lead mining in Swaledale, and three at archaeology including further industrial archaeology. These were well supported despite the inclement weather on the last day, with a total of 51 people joining in.



On the Grinton Moor Mining Heritage Walk

Our programme of free courses continued in September. Robert White of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) presented two evening sessions looking at interpreting aerial photographs and Lidar images. These are very important in helping us understand the development of medieval Fremington and Grinton. Practical work involved the group looking at examples from the huge collection of images at the YDNPA head office in Bainbridge; a valuable resource which may be viewed by appointment. At the end of the month we began a four week session “Delving into Archives” with Marion Moverley, exploring ecclesiastical, feudal, manorial and fiscal records and importantly not only how to interpret them but also how to find them and organize one’s research. September was a very busy month for us. Mike Haken, Webmaster and Editor of the Roman Antiquities Section of the Yorkshire Archaeological Society, gave a most interesting evening talk on Roman roads in North Yorkshire, focusing on how Lidar imagery has helped reveal what is believed to be a Roman Road from Bainbridge over Swaledale towards Barnard Castle, possibly going to either the fort at Bowes or at Greta Bridge or maybe even both. Fascinating stuff and more for us to investigate.

Early in the month we completed a further two test pits in gardens in Reeth, bringing the total to a creditable twenty-seven. We will do a small number more in Reeth in 2015, including two more with children from Richmond Methodist Primary School, twinned with Arkengarthdale School. The results and what they might mean will be presented at our end-of-year events on Friday 28th and Saturday 29th November, see below.

Towards the end of September a number of us, led by Mike Walton, spent four consecutive days carrying out a geophysical survey of the potential medieval settlement in Grinton; our thanks to Mandy and Simon Barningham, Leo and Margaret Macknight, the landowners and to Raymond Calvert, who farms the land.

Two potential enclosures are visible in the above geophysics images, one in the field second from the right, the other in the small left-most field. We will be organizing a short course next year on interpreting such images, so will say no more at this time.

Further forthcoming events

- (i) The Finds Handling and Identification day, focusing mainly on pottery has proved so popular that we are running this twice, on 8th November and again on 14th March. Both are already full but if you are interested in attending then let me know and I will put you on the reserve list.
- (ii) We have arranged an introductory surveying course led by Miles Johnson of the YDNPA. This will consist of a 2 hour session, Wednesday 3rd December, 7pm-9pm in Reeth Memorial Hall, looking at the principles, techniques, interpretation of drawings etc followed by a practical session the following Sunday, 7th December, 10am-4pm, on the land at Fremington where we believe there might have been a medieval settlement. Places on the Sunday will be limited to ca.15. Please let me know if you wish to come to either the theory session alone on the Wednesday or both Wednesday and Sunday.
- (iii) In the Spring we will offer a follow-up to Roger Martlew's popular short course on British Archaeology. This is scheduled for 5 weeks from Thursday 16th April 2015 to Thursday 14th May inclusive, 7pm-9pm, Reeth Memorial Hall.
- (iv) As mentioned above, we will develop a short course in the New Year on interpreting geophysical survey results; details later
- (v) Finally, our Big Dig weekends for 2015 are provisionally set for 16th/17th May, 20th/21st June, 18th/19th July.

There is also the possibility that we might organize a two-day course Archaeological Illustration. If you are interested in this possibility then please let me know.
